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It's Raining, Now What?

Rainy days can put a real damper on your trip to the barn. Muddy fields, sloppy arenas, and soaked horses are no fun! Don't despair- Try these activities to bust rainy day boredom and to be prepared for the next sunny day!



Name that part: You can use the sheet on page 2 to name the various parts of a horse's body. You can also measure your horse on page 3.

Barn chores: It's not your first choice, but use your down time to give the tack room, feed room, and other areas an extra deep cleaning. You can organize things and get rid of items you haven't used in a while.

Clean tack: Get out the saddle soap and give your tack some extra care. Leather products need a deep cleaning every once in a while. Rainy days are the perfect opportunities to complete this task.

Practice braiding: Whether your horse has a long or short mane, try different types of braids to see what looks best. Don't forget the tail too.

Teach your horse a trick: Can he bow or give you a kiss? These cute gestures can be fun to teach. Try searching online for free resources that show you how.

Puddle practice: Wait for a break in the rain or for it to slow to a sprinkle and hand walk your horse through puddles. This is a great activity to prepare him for crossing streams.

Watch riding videos: On sunny days, you can record yourself riding. If your barn lounge has a TV, put the video in and watch carefully. Take note of the things you do well and what could use some work.





POPSICLE HORSES

You can create your own stable of horses with popsicle sticks. They can make cute book marks for you and fun little gifts to give to your friends. Let your imagination go wild. Your horses can be bay, chestnut, gray or make them any color you want like a carousel horse. Horses can have long manes, short manes. Using paint or glitter you can make spots or stripes...whatever you choose.





- Craft or Popsicle Sticks Scissors Glue Craft Paint Colorful Felt Yarn or fringed trim for your mane Googly eyes Fine point marker
- 1 Paint your popsicle stick, letting one side dry before you paint the other side.
- 2 While drying, cut from an oval for the nose and cut points for the ears.
- 3 Use the fine point marker to place two dots on the nose.
- 4 Create a mane and forelock between the ears using yarn, fringe or trimming felt.
- 5 Once dry, glue the ears and forelock on the top the stick first.
- 6 Now add the mane to one side of the stick near the top.
- 7 Next figure out where you want to place the eyes and glue them on.
- 8 Finally add your nose to the horse.

If you want to hide the edges of the mane, ears and forelock, you may cut out a piece of felt the size of the stick and glue it over the back.

Enjoy your horse.
